An introductory survey of several main themes in the philosophy of religion (natural theology), including faith and reason, religious experience and revelation as grounds for religious belief, arguments for the existence of God (teleological, cosmological, ontological), science and religion, the problem of evil, religion and morality, death and the afterlife, miracles, and the challenge of religious diversity. Readings will be taken from ancient, medieval, and contemporary sources.

**COURSE OUTCOMES OR OBJECTIVES:**

Students will gain a well-founded understanding of contrasting views on a range of topics of current relevance in the philosophy of religion. The course aims at developing skills in conceptual clarification and analysis in understanding and articulating religious ideas from a philosophical perspective.
