COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course examines select themes and fundamental questions in Trinitarian Theology from a Catholic perspective as found in the Old and New Testament, Ecumenical Councils, the Fathers and Scholastics, and to some extent, in modern times. This prepares the ground for making a few important inquiries in light of contemporary concerns from a systematic perspective.

CLASS OBJECTIVES

Identify and become familiar with foundational principles of Trinitarian theology located in important sources relative to central themes

Interpret Trinitarian questions according to the mind of the Church

Develop an appropriate Trinitarian vocabulary

Recognize the relevance of these principles and themes, not only for the broader enterprise of theology, but for contemporary living

Grow in historical knowledge of the context in which these foundational Trinitarian principles and central themes have come under scrutiny and reappeared

Appropriate foundational Trinitarian principles and central themes *via* art and prayer
