TITLE: Christology

COURSE DESCRIPTION: After a brief exploration of the historical value of Gospels and what constitutes a Catholic Christology, this course, considers -- in order of the articles of the Creed -- the Son of God sent into the world in terms of his preexistence, incarnation, path on earth, passion and death, resurrection and exaltation. Examination of each stage entails a biblical aspect and examples are drawn from the wealth of the tradition of the Church, her life, her theology, and her liturgy. Christian experience, especially that of the saints, provides the background as the place of the encounter with Christ. Included are such matters as the ontological constitution of the God-man according to the first seven ecumenical councils, Jesus' consciousness of Himself and His mission, the theological significance of the mysteries of the life of Jesus, the doctrine of redemption, and the Trinitarian, ecclesiological and soteriological significance of Jesus' resurrection both for the household of God and those beyond its borders.

CLASS OBJECTIVES:

- To identify and become familiar with some foundational principles of Christology located in important sources.
- To develop an appropriate Christological vocabulary.
- To recognize the relevance of these principles and themes, not only for the study of theology, but for contemporary living and pastoral leadership.
- To grow in historical knowledge of the context in which these foundational Christological principles and themes have developed.
